The Center for Latin American Arts advances scholarship, performances, and the exhibition of Latin American arts in the popular, folk, and academic traditions from the United States and Spanish-speaking and Portuguese-speaking countries. Based in the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley College of Fine Arts, the Center facilitates the exchange of ideas among students, performers, artists, and scholars united by common interests to bring performances and knowledge of these arts to the Rio Grande Valley community, Texas, and beyond. The core values of the Center are a dedication to community engagement, excellence in scholarship, art production and instruction, and performance, and a focus on student success by providing our students with unique learning opportunities on and off campus. Situated in a border region next to Latin America, UTRGV seeks to become a global leader in the study and performance of Latin American, Latinx, and Iberian arts. The Center for Latin American Arts has served more than 5,000 students of all disciplines from the fine arts, medicine, education, and engineering. Over 1,500 public school students have benefited from workshops and clinics provided by the CLAA and its UTRGV faculty and students this year. Scholars, playwrights, artists, dancers, writers, and music performers have presented their talents and research to members of our community in the past year with generous funding from our winning grants.

In 2022-2023, the CLAA was awarded grants to support outstanding programming and a dedication to community engagement with multidisciplinary projects for students and faculty. These winning grants include funding from the Rae Charitable Trust from Wells Fargo (\$50,000), The Raul Tijerina, Jr. Foundation (\$25,000), the Alice Kleberg Reynolds Foundation (\$20,000), and the Brown Foundation (\$7,000). The Center has achieved its goals this year because of the generosity of these institutions and private donors, who are friends of the community and our Center for Latin American Arts and the College of Fine Arts. We are forever thankful for your support, and we hope you enjoy this overview of our events from the 2022-2023 year.


CLAA YOUTUBE CHANNEL

THE LATIN AMERICAN ART SONG A MIRROR OF IDENTITY

DR. PATRICIA CAICEDO INDEPENDENT SCHOLAR AND PERFORMER BARCELONA, SPAIN

The Center for Latin American Arts hosted visiting musicologist, singer, and physician Dr. Patricia Caicedo in Edinburg and Brownsville for the lectures 'We Are What We Listen To: The Impact of Music on Individual and Social Health' (Edinburg) and 'Entrepreneurship and Making Music in the Twenty-First Century' (Brownsville). Dr. Caicedo is also a physician with a medical degree, and the CLAA collaborated with the School of Social Work and the School of Medicine to invite students to Dr. Caicedo's lecture on the intersection of music and health, which is the subject of her newest book, We Are What We Listen To: The Impact of Music on Individual and Social Health. Dr. Caicedo also discussed her podcast, which she hosts and the entrepreneurial success she has had with her company Mundo Arts, which she developed to create a music publishing house and a record label. Her lectures also examined the history and development of Latin American art songs, the processes of forming national identity, and how these ideas can be seen and heard in the songs of different periods. This is the subject of her book The Latin American Art Song: Sounds of the Imagined Nations. Dr. Caicedo also gave a masterclass workshop for vocal students, sharing her research on Latin American and Iberian art songs.






A LA MUSICA IFLAMENCO CONCERT

The Center for Latin American Arts helped support the RGV Perennial exhibition and event series directed by MFA graduate student Keatan McKeever.

The first workshop in this series of talks and activities, the ECO - Processing Workshop, was a six hour workshop that place Saturday, February 4th, with Entre as the facilitator. The event focused on film-centered discussions about the creation, exhibition, and the preservation of comminity-made cinema. The Eco-Processing Workshop was free and open to the community and all UTRGV students.

The second workshop that took place Saturday, February 18th, with Javier Dragustinovis, a Matamoros-based artist and curator for the The Contemporary Art Museum of Tamaulipas (MACT), was guiding participants through a contemporary drawing workshop. Javier explores memory, socio-cultural politics, and industrialization through a multi-media approach and community-based art practice.

The RGV Perennial 2023 Exhibition, intended to become an annual show at UTRGV, was held in Brownsville's Rusteberg Gallery. It showcased distinctive artistic works in printmaking, photography, and other media, addressing the issues of migration and sustainability.











































A LA MUSICA FLAMENCO WORKSHOP

EDINBURG, APRIL 28, 2023



Dr. Jeffrey Ward is the Dean of the College of Fine Arts at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley (UTRGV). The College, made up of the School of Art and Design, School of Music, Department of Theatre, Department of Dance, and Department of Creative Writing, is committed to connecting the students of the Rio Grande Valley and beyond to high-quality teaching, research, and creative activity; partnerships with Arts organizations and Industry; and global citizenship rooted in improving communities.

Prior to his role at UTRGV, Dr. Ward served as the Director of the School of Music, Theatre, and Dance, and Professor of Music Education at Kansas State University and as the Associate Dean in the College of Fine Arts and Communication and the Associate Director of the School of Music at East Carolina University in Greenville, NC. Dr. Ward received his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Music Education (Conducting) from Shenandoah Conservatory in Winchester, VA; his Master of Music degree in Choral Conducting from East Carolina University; and his Bachelor of Arts in Music Education from Rollins College in Winter Park, FL.

Dr. Ward's research focuses on assessment, community music, and music teacher education. Dr. Ward is Past Chair of the Assessment Special Research Interest Group of the National Association for Music Education and a reviewer for the International Symposium for Assessment in Music Education. As a conductor, Dr. Ward has served as the Artistic Director of the Manhattan (KS) Masterworks Chorale and the Greenville (NC) Choral Society, as well as in conducting positions at First United Methodist Church of Manhattan, St. James United Methodist Church of Greenville, and Monumental United Methodist Church of Portsmouth (VA).

Dr. Katherine Moore McAllen has been the Director of the Center for Latin American Arts since 2019, and she is an Associate Professor of Art History in the School of Art & Design at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley. She received her PhD in from Harvard University, her M.A. from the University of Texas, Austin and her B.A from Trinity University. Her research has been supported by the Fulbright and the Carl and Marilynn Thoma Art Foundation as the 2019-2020 Marilynn Thoma Post-Doctoral Fellow. Her work at the UTRGV Center for Latin American Arts has been supported by the Raul Tijerina, Jr. Foundation, the Alice Kleberg Reynolds Foundation, the Rea Charitable Trust, and the Brown Foundation.

Her publications on the history of art and architecture and cultural exchange in colonial Perú and México include essays in the anthology The New World in Early Modern Italy, 1492-1750 (Cambridge University Press, 2017), an essay in Circa 1718 from Trinity University Press (2018), an essay in the Journal of Jesuit Studies (2019), three essays in the Latin American and Latinx Visual Culture journal (2021 and 2022), and a recent essay in the Colonial Latin American Review (2024). Together with Verónica Muñoz-Nájar, she also co-edited a two-volume publication with a collection of essays in Spanish and English titled The Thoma Dialogues in the Latin American and Latinx Visual Culture journal (volume 3.3 and 3.4). As guest editors, Katherine and Verónica published two essays together and edited twelve other essays by leading scholars in the field examining the visual culture of Latin America and museum studies from the colonial to the contemporary periods. Her most recent curatorial work as Director of the Center for Latin American Arts includes organizing the exhibition Uncovered Spaces with artists such as Maria Magdalena Campos Pons, Margarita Cabrera, and Wendy Red Star in a collaboration with Raheleh Filsoofi of Vanderbilt University. All the CLAA events can be seen on the CLAA website and the CLAA YouTube channel. She has recently been named the Maryalice Shary Shivers Endowed Chair of Fine Arts at UTRGV.




